You would have been able to see pictures on the Facebook page of the recent visit to Scotland of Jamal Shehade. You will read more about it in this newsletter. Many of you will have met Jamal. He is the Director of the House of Grace in Haifa, a partner in Haifa, where people coming out of prison are welcomed and supported on their way to a new life out of prison. Jamal's visit was partly funded by The Friends.

He toured the country for ten days with Muriel Pearson: together they addressed meetings, had lunch with the Moderator, met all sorts of people involved with prison



and rehabilitation issues; and raised consciousness and pricked consciences. The meeting in Perth,

organised by The Friends, was attended by about one hundred people.

There are other good things happening, as you will discover in this newsletter: and there are hints of other good things still which may be about to happen.

News from our Ministers

Rev Dr Stewart Gillan

Stewart's patience was rewarded – he finally arrived in Jerusalem in mid-December and paints a picture of his first two months.



I am enjoying the weekly celebration of the sacrament, something new for me, and the time of sharing 'Hearing the Word together' that I have introduced. I am struck by how different the stories of origin are of the Tiberias and Jerusalem Churches. What has been the legacy of our two founding stories, and where do we wish to take our congregations now, I have been asking myself.

Our numbers in Jerusalem are very low, averaging 12–14. On three Sundays we have been over 20, but on other Sundays we struggle to get into double digits. We will have to work hard and well to rebuild a congregation.

I am keen to explore digital means of **sharing worship**, reaching out and telling our and our partners' story, and to enhance our worship space itself for those who attend, thinking an approach to The Friends would be in order once we know what we want to do.

Along with Lilian (Manager), Tony (Head Reception) and Chef Wadie, we are establishing healthy working relationships between Church and Guesthouse.

Together with Muriel I have been taking Assemblies and beginning to build relationships with staff at Tabeetha School. Christmas Assemblies provided an opportunity to meet some of the parents as well, and to see students in action in front of peers and parents.

Highlights with partners:

• The ordination of the Rev Sally Azar, the first Palestinian woman to be ordained a Pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

- Visiting <u>Tent of Nations</u> and beginning to journey with the Nassar family. We have set Monday 27 February as a date for the resumption of our Communion Services in the Olive Grove Chapel.
- Opportunities to meet people from the broad ecumenism among the Churches in Jerusalem including ecumenical worship during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.
- Meetings with Wi'am staff regarding a proposed bible study series in Bethlehem with Christian and community leaders.
- Visiting the Bedouin community Umm Al Khair, south of Hebron, and meeting local leaders.
- Attending *Praying Together* in Jerusalem on two occasions, which meets on the first Thursday of each month in a Jewish, Christian or Muslim holy place.
- Attending the handover ceremony of EAPPI.

Finally, on a personal level, my A-3 Clergy Visa was extended on 26 January for 12 months, multi entry, for which I give thanks. I have begun to study Arabic twice weekly in Bethlehem - colloquial not classic!

Rev Muriel Pearson

Since her last report Muriel has been busy with activities around Christmas, a visit home to family and the visit to Scotland of Jamal Shehade in January 2023.

I was glad to join staff from the Scots

Hotel for their Christmas meal out which was a very

happy occasion. We also had a very good meal on Christmas Eve at the Hotel with members of the congregation and their families.

A 'Welcoming the Light' event in December combined Advent with the end of Hanukkah and went very well with about 80 attending plus the choir. Feedback confirmed folks appreciated meeting people beyond their usual circle. And the fish and chips ran out!



The attendance at the Watchnight service on Christmas Eve and the Christmas Day service was boosted by the event, with members of the Messianic community from Porrhiya joining us.



Yakfie, the flat above the manse, is almost always occupied. The EAPPI volunteers, and others, have been

advertising it via social media! At present the accommodation is offered free and guests can, if they choose, eat in the staff dining room in the hotel. I hope this will continue to be the case.

The Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in

Palestine and Israel (EAPPI) have been reporting more incidents of settler harassment and violence than ever before and have themselves been on the receiving end of increasing aggression, although they are simply observing. When there is an aggression



by a Palestinian the response is brutal and punishes family, extended family and friends as well as the perpetrator. It is hard to see how this can end well.

Over the next few months, alongside welcoming a number of pilgrim groups I will be working to make an action plan around development of the Upper Rooms at St Andrew's Tiberias and developing a concert programme at the church in conjunction with the hotel.

I have just finished reading *Stranger in my Own*



Land by Fida Jiryis - the story of one Palestinian Israeli family who spent time My Own Land in Lebanon and Cyprus before returning to their family village in Galilee. I found this book confirmed and explained many

of the things Jamal shares about being an Arab Israeli and is helpful in explaining attitudes on all sides.

Visit to Scotland by Jamal Shehade, House of Grace, a partner of the CoS

The Friends of St Andrew's Jerusalem & Tiberias sponsored Jamal's visit in January 2023 Jamal writes:



I really appreciate the great effort Muriel invested in that visit and is still doing. I feel really blessed to have her as a friend. Having her **as partner and supporter** on the visit made it much easier and more comfortable.

The visits we had and the meetings we attended gave me a lot of material to think of and consider. Personally, I found

the encounters very interesting and enriching.

Professionally, the meetings with Crossreach, <u>Vox Liminis</u> and <u>Hot Chocolate</u> gave me some tools to think about and discuss with our staff to try and use those in our work and widen our intervention ways with our "clients", to try **being extra creative** in what we can offer them.

On the issue of Palestinians with Israeli citizenship dealing with the conflict, I think the importance of introducing my perspective to communities in Scotland was very clear. The knowledge there about our challenges and our role in living with the effects of the conflict, is lacking; therefore pointing out this information and sharing our stories gave me the feeling that it has been enlightening for many. For me this is a great success, because I think we have an important role that needs to be supported and the awareness about it should be raised.

I think that we were able to touch and achieve good results mentioned in the goals we set before leaving. Some goals will need more time to develop.

From my point of view this visit widened our circle of friends in the Church of Scotland and people know the House of Grace better as well. Hopefully this will encourage communities and groups to visit in the future.

Muriel's response

It was an excellent project and a very good use of resources. The whole trip, including a generous gift to host families, cost £1,400 and some additional costs for events covered by Presbytery of Glasgow and The Friends of StAJ&T.

It was great to be able to accompany Jamal, not only because I learned so much, but because it gave me an opportunity to meet and share too.

I would like to **see the model repeated**, with the emphasis being awareness raising about Israel/oPt, perhaps once a year. Perhaps next year Stewart could accompany a Palestinian from the West Bank.

In this edition we meet The Very Rev Andrew McLellan, Convener of The Friends


I really enjoy my part in the life of The Friends: on the Committee we are a lively and committed team. To have regular contact with our two

Scholarship Programme


The Friends offer a wonderful **opportunity for a minister or theology student**,

Faith Rewarded...excerpt

On Sunday, 11th March, 1979, the Rev Tom Houston led the service of worship with US President Jimmy Carter and the First Lady in the congregation. Rizek (Session Clerk) recalls that he had the opportunity of greeting them and showing them to their seats. "President Carter said he did not want to sit in the front row, so I led them to a row behind. As I handed him the Bible I noticed that by chance I had chosen for him the seat which had on it the name 'Cairo'" As it happened the purpose of his visit to the Middle East was to explore the options for peace in the region and as part of that process he was travelling to Cairo the next day.

We Will Remember Them

Immediately following the capture of Nebi Samuel in 1917, the 52nd Lowland Division was ordered to retrace its steps to Ramleh. On 28 November 1917




the Turks mounted a fierce attack with 500 men at El Burj. **2Lt Stanley Boughey of the 4**th **Battalion Royal Scots Fusiliers** counter-attacked with his platoon. The Turks fled, with Boughey hurling Mills grenades as they did so, and 30 Turks surrendered to him. He then turned to obtain some more grenades but was mortally wounded in the head and died soon afterwards. For his conspicuous bravery, he was **awarded the Victoria Cross**.

St Andrew's, Jerusalem, the only Church of Scotland built as a War Memorial, is dedicated to the Scots who lost their lives in the region. Plaques throughout the church identify those, such as 2Lt Stanley Boughey, who will never be forgotten.
